ACADEMIC SENATE UPDATE

Eric Jacobson reported on the following:

- 1. Through the efforts of Carol Lee, Northern Arizona University in Yuma is offering a Bachelor Degree in Social Work.
- 2. Thanks was extended to all of the IVC students who presented Neil Simon's comedy, *The Good Doctor*, on April 4-7, 2001. The acting was superb, the set were imaginative, and the direction by Dr. James Patterson was first rate.
- 3. Gabriel Torres, Larry Welch, and Olga Artechi were elected to the Academic Senate for three-year terms.

PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

Dr. Dominguez introduced Lt. Col. Jeff Krammer, Program Manager for Advanced Distributive Learning for the California National Guard. Col. Krammer presented information on the Distributive Training Technology Project, which is a national learning and information delivery system for Guardsmen and their community providing access to education, training, and information for development of new skills, lifelong learning, and enhanced quality of life. The proposal is to partner with IVC, and would provide advanced technology connecting a classroom in the Workforce Development Center with a high-bandwidth network that would accommodate the transfer of voice, video and data simultaneously, with communications functions necessary to support the National Guard's readiness objectives, and providing IVC access to telecommunications technologies that might other wise be costprohibitive. The estimated benefit to IVC is technology hardware valued at \$1.5 million, which would greatly enhance IVC's distance learning potential.

SPRING 2001 ENROLLMENT REPORT

Sandra Standiford reported that after telephone registration for the spring 2001 semester and wait list moves, enrollment was 5,848. This is an increase of nine more students over the same time last year. A total of 839 students were moved from the wait list into 331 classes. The headcount at the census date reflected a decrease by 2.5%; full-time enrollment increased by 1.9%; part-time enrollment decreased by 4.7%; 64.9% of the enrollment is part-time and 35.1% is full-time; 62.7% of the enrollment is female; 85.8% of the students are Hispanic; 55.9% of the students are under 25 years of age.

EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS ON THE PRESIDENT'S CABINET

Eric Jacobson stated that the Technical Assistance Visit, the Administration/Senate Retreat and the Accreditation Team summary called for widening the involvement of faculty, students and classified employees in the decision making process. The request was to include faculty, students, and classified employees on the President's Cabinet in an ex-officio capacity.

Dr. Dominguez reviewed the Shared Governance Process adopted by the Board in March 1995. Dr. Dominguez stated that ex-officio representatives were invited to participate in Administrative Council.

It was the consensus of the Board to refer this issue back to Administration to consult with the Academic Senate, until such time that agreement is reached.

BOND ISSUE TASK FORCE

Discussion surrounded the necessity for a new Science Building. The present building has outdated plumbing that is expensive to repair, there is a lack of space to adequately deal with hazardous waste materials, and a lack of lab and classroom space to meet the demand. The request was to establish a Task Force made up of a cross-section of every area for long-range planning for the major election in 2004. Concern was expressed over dissention against the bond from within the campus community, as took place with Bond Measure R. A classroom efficiency study to correctly identify rooms on campus, will be taking place during spring break by Carlos Fletes, Rick Webster, and Jim Sanders. The Board asked for a report on this issue at the next meeting.

The Dean of Instruction for Extended Campus Shall:

- 3. Maintain the development and supervision for noncredit, contract education, community service and adult education programs;
- 4. Develop and maintain the budgets for the Extended Campus;
- 5. Collaborate with division chairs, counseling staff, registration personnel and administration to ensure compliance with District policies and procedures in the registration process and general operations for the Extended Campus classes including Program Review;

- 6. Collaborate with division chairs for recruitment of part-time faculty for employment in the Extended Campus;
- 7. Determine need and make recommendations to the Vice President for Academic Services for new courses and curricula to better serve the various communities of the District;
- 8. Assist the Vice President for Academic Services in the evaluation of faculty, full-time and part-time, employed in the extended campus;
- 9. Collaborate with the Dean for Instruction for Applied Sciences, community leaders and District advisory groups to ascertain the educational needs of specific occupational areas.
- 10. Maintain project records and necessary data for facilitating report requirements.
- 11. Supervise and monitor security and general maintenance of all facilities and Extended Campus class sites.
- 12. Make formal presentations to various interest groups for strengthening the image of Imperial Valley College;
- 13. Cooperate with other administrators for institutional grants, bonds, and other fund-raising projects;
- 14. Maintain a major role in the faculty development process of extended campus faculty;
- 15. Conduct orientation sessions for Extended Campus faculty and staff;
- 16. Assist the Vice President for Academic Services in planning class schedules for courses offered in the Extended Campus;
- 17. Maintain the leadership role in the procurement and utilization of facilities to ensure student access to Extended Campus locations;
- 18. Perform other functions assigned by the Superintendent/President or the Vice President for Academic Services.
