Jr. High Academies

A CTE academy was coordinated on Saturday, March 28th where ~100 Jr. High students each attended 3 hands-on workshops. Topics included ag, air-conditioning, auto tech, AJ, chemistry, construction, electrical wiring, electronics, nursing, and welding.
