Course Description: An introduction to debate, with emphasis on the creation and refutation of arguments concerning current social, political and legal issues.

Course Objectives:

- 1. The student will learn the basic components of an argument assertion, reasoning, and evidence.
- 2. The student will identify fallacious argumentation.
- 3. The student will critique arguments.
- 4. The student will compile arguments and evidence to support various sides of commonly debated topics (e.g., gun control, capital punishment, legalization of prostitution, animal rights, euthanasia, etc.).
- 5. The student will participate in formal classroom debates.
- 6. The student will understand the responsibilities of the proposition vs. opposition as well as the role of each speaker on the proposition and opposition teams.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)

After successfully completing this course:

- Students will be able to construct and build a basic case for a parliamentary debate.
- Students will be able to recognize and avoid using ten logical fallacies during classroom presentations.
- Students will be able to write and submit five properly-worded debate propositions.
