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### **Course Description:**

An introduction to American Sign Language and fingerspelling. The course will focus on conversational skill, grammar, and vocabulary as it is used in the Deaf Community. Deaf Culture will be examined.

Objectives: By the end of this course the students should be able to:

- 1. Achieve an increased knowledge on the causes, types and psychological and educational impact of deafness as measured by teacher-made-test achieving criteria of C or better.
- 2. Increase deaf culture awareness and sensitivity as measured by community participation data probe achieving criteria of C or better.
- 3. Develop basic fingerspelling skills and fundamental sign language vocabulary, syntax, and grammatical features to communicate with deaf and hard of hearing individuals as measured by Dialogue /Song/Story in Sign scoring rubric achieving a criteria of *C* or better.
